By The Numbers: How Medicaid Strengthens Minnesota

Medicaid is not only a lifeline for millions of Minnesotans, it strengthens our communities in countless ways. These are reasons why the program is overwhelmingly popular: <u>74 percent</u> of Americans support Medicaid.

MINNESOTANS DEPEND ON MEDICAID

- **1,060,478 Minnesotans Are Covered Through Medicaid.** 1,060,478 Minnesotans <u>have medical coverage</u> through Medicaid most of them children, seniors, and people with disabilities.
- In Minnesota, Adults Up To 138 Percent Of The Federal Poverty Line May Enroll In Medicaid. After expanding Medicaid, Minnesota residents earning up to 138 percent of the federal poverty line are now eligible to enroll in Medicaid.
- **222,900 Minnesotans Have Gained Coverage Through Medicaid Expansion.** Thanks to Medicaid expansion, 222,900 Minnesota residents <u>are enrolled</u> in the program.

MEDICAID IS A LIFELINE FOR CHILDREN, SENIORS, AND PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

25 Percent of Minnesota's Children Rely on Medicaid. 25 percent of Minnesota <u>children rely</u> on Medicaid for coverage. Medicaid pays almost \$4 billion annually in school-based health services. Schools depend on these funds connect students with vital health resources — <u>68 percent</u> of school superintendents said that they used these funds to keep nurses, counselors, and speech therapists on staff.

Medicaid Supports 52 Percent Of Minnesotans In Nursing Homes. 52 percent of Minnesotans living in nursing homes <u>have coverage</u> through Medicaid.

Medicaid Covers 19 Percent of Minnesota's Seniors and People with Disabilities. In Minnesota, 19 percent of seniors and people with disabilities <u>have health coverage through Medicaid</u>, including for nursing home care. Nationally, approximately <u>one in four people</u> on Medicaid are seniors (9 percent) or people with disabilities (15 percent). However, their care represents about <u>two-thirds</u> of all Medicaid spending. In other words, funding cuts to Medicaid will disproportionately affect the most vulnerable.

MEDICAID HELPS MINNESOTANS ACCESS TREATMENT FOR OPIOID ADDICTION

Medicaid Covers <u>One In Four</u> **Americans With An Opioid Use Disorder**. Medicaid pays for 32 percent of Minnesota's <u>buprenorphine</u> expenditure, a medication used to treat opioid addiction.

REPUBLICANS' WAR ON THE ACA AND MEDICAID JEOPARDIZES COVERAGE FOR 1 MILLION MINNESOTANS

222,900 Minnesotans Enrolled Through Medicaid Expansion Now At Risk. The Graham-Cassidy bill would eliminate <u>Medicaid expansion</u>, which has helped 222,900 Minnesotans receive quality, affordable coverage, and put part of its funding into inadequate block grants. The bill would further punish states that expanded Medicaid by <u>redistributing</u> funds to states that did not expand Medicaid.

1,060,478 Minnesotans With Traditional Medicaid Coverage, Including Seniors, People With Disabilities, And Children, Are At Risk. The Graham-Cassidy bill that President Trump revived in his FY19 budget proposal would turn traditional Medicaid into a per capita cap, meaning the 1,060,478 Minnesotans who are <u>enrolled</u> on Medicaid would have their care jeopardized. Medicaid disproportionately helps children, seniors in nursing home care and people with disabilities. A study by <u>Avalere</u> found that Graham-Cassidy would cut funding for people with disabilities by 15 percent and 31 percent for children by 2036.

523,457 Minnesota Children's Care Is At Risk. 523,457 Minnesota kids are currently <u>enrolled</u> in Medicaid and CHIP, and their care could be at risk because of funding cuts in Graham-Cassidy.
