

By The Numbers: How Medicaid Strengthens Connecticut

Medicaid is not only a lifeline for millions of Nutmeggers, it strengthens our communities in countless ways. These are reasons why the program is overwhelmingly popular: 74 percent of Americans support Medicaid.

NUTMEGGERS DEPEND ON MEDICAID

- **836,906 Nutmeggers Are Covered Through Medicaid.** 836,906 Nutmeggers <u>have medical coverage</u> through Medicaid most of them children, seniors, and people with disabilities.
- In Connecticut, Adults Up To 138 Percent Of The Federal Poverty Line May Enroll In Medicaid. After expanding
 Medicaid, Connecticut residents earning up to 138 percent of the federal poverty line are now eligible to enroll in
 Medicaid.
- **216,900 Nutmeggers Have Gained Coverage Through Medicaid Expansion.** Thanks to Medicaid expansion, 216,900 Connecticut residents <u>are enrolled</u> in the program.

MEDICAID IS A LIFELINE FOR CHILDREN, SENIORS, AND PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

40 Percent of Connecticut's Children Rely on Medicaid. 40 percent of Connecticut <u>children rely</u> on Medicaid for coverage. Medicaid pays almost \$4 billion annually in school-based health services. Schools depend on these funds connect students with vital health resources — <u>68 percent</u> of school superintendents said that they used these funds to keep nurses, counselors, and speech therapists on staff.

Medicaid Supports 69 Percent Of Nutmeggers In Nursing Homes. 69 percent of Nutmeggers living in nursing homes have coverage through Medicaid.

Medicaid Covers 22 Percent of Connecticut's Seniors and People with Disabilities. In Connecticut, 22 percent of seniors and people with disabilities have health coverage through Medicaid, including for nursing home care. Nationally, approximately one-in-four-people on Medicaid are seniors (9 percent) or people with disabilities (15 percent). However, their care represents about two-thirds of all Medicaid spending. In other words, funding cuts to Medicaid will disproportionately affect the most vulnerable.

MEDICAID HELPS NUTMEGGERS ACCESS TREATMENT FOR OPIOID ADDICTION

Medicaid Covers One In Four Americans With An Opioid Use Disorder. Medicaid pays for 44 percent of Connecticut's <u>buprenorphine</u> expenditure, a medication used to treat opioid addiction.

REPUBLICANS' WAR ON THE ACA AND MEDICAID JEOPARDIZES COVERAGE FOR NEARLY 840,000 NUTMEGGERS

216,900 Nutmeggers Enrolled Through Medicaid Expansion Now At Risk. The Graham-Cassidy bill would eliminate Medicaid expansion, which has helped 216,900 Nutmeggers receive quality, affordable coverage, and put part of its funding into inadequate block grants. The bill would further punish states that expanded Medicaid by redistributing funds to states that did not expand Medicaid.

836,906 Nutmeggers With Traditional Medicaid Coverage, Including Seniors, People With Disabilities, And Children, Are At Risk. The Graham-Cassidy bill that President Trump revived in his FY19 budget proposal would turn traditional Medicaid into a per capita cap, meaning the 836,906 Nutmeggers who are <u>enrolled</u> on Medicaid would have their care jeopardized. Medicaid disproportionately helps children, seniors in nursing home care and people with disabilities. A study by <u>Avalere</u> found that Graham-Cassidy would cut funding for people with disabilities by 15 percent and 31 percent for children by 2036.

334,701 Connecticut Children's Care Is At Risk. 334,701 Connecticut kids are currently <u>enrolled</u> in Medicaid and CHIP, and their care could be at risk because of funding cuts in Graham-Cassidy.
