PENNSYLVANIANS DEPEND ON MEDICAID

- **2,970,369 Pennsylvanians Are Covered Through Medicaid.** 2,970,369 Pennsylvanians <u>have medical coverage</u> through Medicaid most of them children, seniors, and people with disabilities.
- In Pennsylvania, Adults Up To 138 Percent Of The Federal Poverty Line May Enroll In Medicaid. After expanding Medicaid, Pennsylvania residents earning up to 138 percent of the federal poverty line are now eligible to enroll in Medicaid.
- **751,000 Pennsylvanians Have Gained Coverage Through Medicaid Expansion.** Thanks to Medicaid expansion, 751,000 Pennsylvania residents are enrolled in the program.

MEDICAID IS A LIFELINE FOR CHILDREN, SENIORS, AND PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

38 Percent of Pennsylvania's Children Rely on Medicaid. 38 percent of Pennsylvania <u>children rely</u> on Medicaid for coverage. Medicaid pays almost \$4 billion annually in school-based health services. Schools depend on these funds connect students with vital health resources — <u>68 percent</u> of school superintendents said that they used these funds to keep nurses, counselors, and speech therapists on staff.

Medicaid Supports 63 Percent Of Pennsylvanians In Nursing Homes. 63 percent of Pennsylvanians living in nursing homes <u>have coverage</u> through Medicaid.

Medicaid Covers One In Four Americans With An Opioid Use Disorder. Medicaid pays for 29 percent of Pennsylvania's buprenorphine expenditure, a medication used to treat opioid addiction.

REPUBLICANS' WAR ON THE ACA AND MEDICAID JEOPARDIZES COVERAGE FOR MILLIONS OF PENNSYLVANIANS

751,000 Pennsylvanians Enrolled Through Medicaid Expansion Now At Risk. The Graham-Cassidy bill would eliminate <u>Medicaid expansion</u>, which has helped 751,000 Pennsylvanians receive quality, affordable coverage, and put part of its funding into inadequate block grants. The bill would further punish states that expanded Medicaid by <u>redistributing</u> funds to states that did not expand Medicaid.

2,970,369 Pennsylvanians With Traditional Medicaid Coverage, Including Seniors, People With Disabilities, And Children, Are At Risk. The Graham-Cassidy bill that President Trump revived in his FY19 budget proposal would turn traditional Medicaid into a per capita cap, meaning the 2,970,369 Pennsylvanians who are <u>enrolled</u> on Medicaid would have their care jeopardized. Medicaid disproportionately helps children, seniors in nursing home care and people with disabilities. A study by <u>Avalere</u> found that Graham-Cassidy would cut funding for people with disabilities by 15 percent and 31 percent for children by 2036.

1,401,918 Pennsylvania Children's Care Is At Risk. 1,401,918 Pennsylvania kids are currently <u>enrolled</u> in Medicaid and CHIP, and their care could be at risk because of funding cuts in Graham-Cassidy.
