

By The Numbers: How Medicaid Strengthens Texas

Medicaid is not only a lifeline for millions of Texans, it strengthens our communities in countless ways. These are reasons why the program is overwhelmingly popular: <u>74 percent</u> of Americans support Medicaid.

TEXANS DEPEND ON MEDICAID

- **4,792,589 Texans Are Covered Through Medicaid.** Over 4,792,589 Texans <u>have medical coverage</u> through Medicaid most of them children, seniors, and people with disabilities.
- In Texas, Parents Up To 18 Percent Of The Federal Poverty Line May Enroll In Medicaid. By not fully expanding Medicaid, Texas has restricted its Medicaid program such that only Parents earning up to 18 percent of the federal poverty line are eligible to enroll in Medicaid. If Texas expanded its program, more than 3 million more adults could gain coverage through Medicaid.

MEDICAID IS A LIFELINE FOR CHILDREN, SENIORS, AND PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

38 Percent of Texas's Children Rely on Medicaid. 38 percent of Texas <u>children rely</u> on Medicaid for coverage. Medicaid pays almost \$4 billion annually in school-based health services. Schools depend on these funds connect students with vital health resources — <u>68 percent</u> of school superintendents said that they used these funds to keep nurses, counselors, and speech therapists on staff.

Medicaid Supports 61 Percent Of Texans In Nursing Homes. 61 percent of Texans living in nursing homes <u>have coverage</u> through Medicaid.

Medicaid Covers 21 Percent of Texas's Seniors and People with Disabilities. In Texas, 21 percent of seniors and people with disabilities have health coverage through Medicaid, including for nursing home care. Nationally, approximately one-in-four-people on Medicaid are seniors (9 percent) or people with disabilities (15 percent). However, their care represents about two-thirds of all Medicaid spending. In other words, funding cuts to Medicaid will disproportionately affect the most vulnerable.

MEDICAID HELPS TEXANS ACCESS TREATMENT FOR OPIOID ADDICTION

Medicaid Covers One In Four Americans With An Opioid Use Disorder. Medicaid pays for 6 percent of Texas's buprenorphine expenditure, a medication used to treat opioid addiction.

REPUBLICANS' WAR ON THE ACA AND MEDICAID JEOPARDIZES COVERAGE FOR 4.8 MILLION TEXANS

4,792,589 Texans With Traditional Medicaid Coverage, Including Seniors, People With Disabilities, And Children, Are At Risk. The Graham-Cassidy bill that President Trump revived in his FY19 budget proposal would turn traditional Medicaid into a per capita cap, meaning the 4,792,589 Texans who are <u>enrolled</u> on Medicaid would have their care jeopardized. Medicaid disproportionately helps children, seniors in nursing home care and people with disabilities. A study by <u>Avalere</u> found that Graham-Cassidy would cut funding for people with disabilities by 15 percent and 31 percent for children by 2036.

3,509,398 Texas Children's Care Is At Risk. 3,509,398 Texas kids are currently <u>enrolled</u> in Medicaid and CHIP, and their care could be at risk because of funding cuts in Graham-Cassidy.
