

By The Numbers: How Medicaid Strengthens Utah

Medicaid is not only a lifeline for millions of Utahns, it strengthens our communities in countless ways. These are reasons why the program is overwhelmingly popular: <u>74 percent</u> of Americans support Medicaid.

UTAHNS DEPEND ON MEDICAID

- **299,556 Utahns Are Covered Through Medicaid.** Over 299,556 Utahns <u>have medical coverage</u> through Medicaid most of them children, seniors, and people with disabilities.
- In Utah, Parents Up To 60 Percent Of The Federal Poverty Line May Enroll In Medicaid. By not fully expanding Medicaid, Utah has restricted its Medicaid program such that only Parents earning up to 60 percent of the federal poverty line are eligible to enroll in Medicaid. If Utah expanded its program, 298,000 more adults could gain coverage through Medicaid.

MEDICAID IS A LIFELINE FOR CHILDREN, SENIORS, AND PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

19 Percent of Utah's Children Rely on Medicaid. 19 percent of Utah <u>children rely</u> on Medicaid for coverage. Medicaid pays almost \$4 billion annually in school-based health services. Schools depend on these funds connect students with vital health resources — <u>68 percent</u> of school superintendents said that they used these funds to keep nurses, counselors, and speech therapists on staff.

Medicaid Supports 51 Percent Of Utahns In Nursing Homes. 51 percent of Utahns living in nursing homes <u>have coverage</u> through Medicaid.

Medicaid Covers 13 Percent of Utah's Seniors and People with Disabilities. In Utah, 13 percent of seniors and people with disabilities have health coverage through Medicaid, including for nursing home care. Nationally, approximately one-in-four-people on Medicaid are seniors (9 percent) or people with disabilities (15 percent). However, their care represents about two-thirds of all Medicaid spending. In other words, funding cuts to Medicaid will disproportionately affect the most vulnerable.

MEDICAID HELPS UTAHNS ACCESS TREATMENT FOR OPIOID ADDICTION

Medicaid Covers One In Four Americans With An Opioid Use Disorder. Medicaid pays for 4 percent of Utah's buprenorphine expenditure, a medication used to treat opioid addiction.

REPUBLICANS' WAR ON THE ACA AND MEDICAID JEOPARDIZES COVERAGE FOR NEARLY 300,000 UTAHNS

299,556 Utahns With Traditional Medicaid Coverage, Including Seniors, People With Disabilities, And Children, Are At Risk. The Graham-Cassidy bill that President Trump revived in his FY19 budget proposal would turn traditional Medicaid into a per capita cap, meaning the 299,556 Utahns who are enrolled on Medicaid would have their care jeopardized. Medicaid disproportionately helps children, seniors in nursing home care and people with disabilities. A study by Avalere found that Graham-Cassidy would cut funding for people with disabilities by 15 percent and 31 percent for children by 2036.

208,460 Utah Children's Care Is At Risk. 208,460 Utah kids are currently <u>enrolled</u> in Medicaid and CHIP, and their care could be at risk because of funding cuts in Graham-Cassidy.
