Medicaid is not only a lifeline for millions of Virginians, it strengthens our communities in countless ways. These are reasons why the program is overwhelmingly popular: 74 percent of Americans support Medicaid.

VIRGINIANS DEPEND ON MEDICAID

- **1,014,833 Virginians Are Covered Through Medicaid.** Over 1,014,833 Virginians <u>have medical coverage</u> through Medicaid most of them children, seniors, and people with disabilities.
- In Virginia, Parents Up To 38 Percent Of The Federal Poverty Line May Enroll In Medicaid. By not fully expanding Medicaid, Virginia has restricted its Medicaid program such that only Parents earning up to 38 percent of the federal poverty line are eligible to enroll in Medicaid. If Virginia expanded its program, 849,000 more adults could gain coverage through Medicaid.

MEDICAID IS A LIFELINE FOR CHILDREN, SENIORS, AND PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

27 Percent of Virginia's Children Rely on Medicaid. 27 percent of Virginia <u>children rely</u> on Medicaid for coverage. Medicaid pays almost \$4 billion annually in school-based health services. Schools depend on these funds connect students with vital health resources — <u>68 percent</u> of school superintendents said that they used these funds to keep nurses, counselors, and speech therapists on staff.

Medicaid Supports 59 Percent Of Virginians In Nursing Homes. 59 percent of Virginians living in nursing homes <u>have coverage</u> through Medicaid.

MEDICAID HELPS VIRGINIANS ACCESS TREATMENT FOR OPIOID ADDICTION

Medicaid Covers One In Four Americans With An Opioid Use Disorder. Medicaid pays for 13 percent of Virginia's buprenorphine expenditure, a medication used to treat opioid addiction.

REPUBLICANS' WAR ON THE ACA AND MEDICAID JEOPARDIZES COVERAGE FOR MORE THAN 1 MILLION VIRGINIANS

1,014,833 Virginians With Traditional Medicaid Coverage, Including Seniors, People With Disabilities, And Children, Are At Risk. The Graham-Cassidy bill that President Trump revived in his FY19 budget proposal would turn traditional Medicaid into a per capita cap, meaning the 1,014,833 Virginians who are <u>enrolled</u> on Medicaid would have their care jeopardized. Medicaid disproportionately helps children, seniors in nursing home care and people with disabilities. A study by <u>Avalere</u> found that Graham-Cassidy would cut funding for people with disabilities by 15 percent and 31 percent for children by 2036.

675,976 Virginia Children's Care Is At Risk. 675,976 Virginia kids are currently <u>enrolled</u> in Medicaid and CHIP, and their care could be at risk because of funding cuts in Graham-Cassidy.
