

By The Numbers: How Medicaid Strengthens Wisconsin

Medicaid is not only a lifeline for millions of Wisconsinites, it strengthens our communities in countless ways. These are reasons why the program is overwhelmingly popular: 74 percent of Americans support Medicaid.

WISCONSINITES DEPEND ON MEDICAID

- **1,034,480 Wisconsinites Are Covered Through Medicaid.** Over 1,034,480 Wisconsinites <u>have medical coverage</u> through Medicaid most of them children, seniors, and people with disabilities.
- In Wisconsin, Adults Up To 100 Percent Of The Federal Poverty Line May Enroll In Medicaid. By not fully expanding Medicaid, Wisconsin has restricted its Medicaid program such that only Residents earning up to 100 percent of the federal poverty line are eligible to enroll in Medicaid. If Wisconsin expanded its program, 119,000 more adults could gain coverage through Medicaid.

MEDICAID IS A LIFELINE FOR CHILDREN, SENIORS, AND PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

35 Percent of Wisconsin's Children Rely on Medicaid. 35 percent of Wisconsin <u>children rely</u> on Medicaid for coverage. Medicaid pays almost \$4 billion annually in school-based health services. Schools depend on these funds connect students with vital health resources — <u>68 percent</u> of school superintendents said that they used these funds to keep nurses, counselors, and speech therapists on staff.

Medicaid Supports 55 Percent Of Wisconsinites In Nursing Homes. 55 percent of Wisconsinites living in nursing homes <u>have coverage</u> through Medicaid.

Medicaid Covers 21 Percent of Wisconsin's Seniors and People with Disabilities. In Wisconsin, 21 percent of seniors and people with disabilities have health coverage through Medicaid, including for nursing home care. Nationally, approximately one-in-four-people on Medicaid are seniors (9 percent) or people with disabilities (15 percent). However, their care represents about two-thirds of all Medicaid spending. In other words, funding cuts to Medicaid will disproportionately affect the most vulnerable.

MEDICAID HELPS WISCONSINITES ACCESS TREATMENT FOR OPIOID ADDICTION

Medicaid Covers One In Four Americans With An Opioid Use Disorder. Medicaid pays for 37 percent of Wisconsin's buprenorphine expenditure, a medication used to treat opioid addiction.

REPUBLICANS' WAR ON THE ACA AND MEDICAID JEOPARDIZES COVERAGE FOR MORE THAN 1 MILLION WISCONSINITES

1,034,480 Wisconsinites With Traditional Medicaid Coverage, Including Seniors, People With Disabilities, And Children, Are At Risk. The Graham-Cassidy bill that President Trump revived in his FY19 budget proposal would turn traditional Medicaid into a per capita cap, meaning the 1,034,480 Wisconsinites who are enrolled on Medicaid would have their care jeopardized. Medicaid disproportionately helps children, seniors in nursing home care and people with disabilities. A study by Avalere found that Graham-Cassidy would cut funding for people with disabilities by 15 percent and 31 percent for children by 2036.

488,590 Wisconsin Children's Care Is At Risk. 488,590 Wisconsin kids are currently <u>enrolled</u> in Medicaid and CHIP, and their care could be at risk because of funding cuts in Graham-Cassidy.
