Survey of 624 likely voters in Arizona, 885 likely voters in Colorado, and 716 likely voters in Iowa, conducted September 30th through October 3rd, 2020

Polling was conducted online from September 30th through October 3rd, 2020. Using Dynamic Online Sampling to obtain a sample reflective of the 2020 electorate, Change Research polled 867 likely voters in the state of South Carolina. Post-stratification weights were made on age, gender, education, region, and 2016 presidential vote to reflect the distribution of voters within the state.
