United for Action: Americans' Agenda for Healthcare

Key findings from a national survey among 1,201 voters Conducted January 25 to 27, 2021 for Protect Our Care

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Key Takeaways

- Lowering healthcare costs and making insurance more affordable for more people stand clearly at the top of voters' priorities for the President and Congress once the COVID rescue plan passes.
- Large bipartisan majorities say that high healthcare costs and people losing coverage are big problems in the country today.
- The top item on the healthcare agenda is stopping excessive drug prices by giving Medicare the power to negotiate with drug companies, and there is large majority support for other Democratic healthcare policies.
- President Biden and Democrats are more trusted than Republicans on healthcare issues, and many voters who supported Republicans in 2020 say they are more likely to vote Democratic in 2022 if Democrats deliver on healthcare.
- Voters want Democrats to focus on doing as much as possible to lower healthcare costs and expand coverage, even if Republicans won't support it.
- Voters recognize that the COVID crisis exposed weaknesses and inequities in our healthcare system, and there is power in framing a health policy agenda around the serious healthcare issues raised by the pandemic.



COVID RESCUE





By a 2-to-1 margin, President Biden and the Democrats are more trusted than the Republicans on dealing with COVID.

Who do you trust more to have the better approach in dealing with the coronavirus pandemic?

Without tie to Biden, Democrats are more trusted than Republicans by a slightly smaller margin (44% to 25%, with 16% trusting both equally).

Voters overwhelmingly support President Biden's coronavirus relief package after reading all its elements.

* Provisions outlined prior to question:

- \$1,400 in economic stimulus payments to individuals, in addition to the \$600 passed in December
- Funding to expand vaccine distribution and increase COVID-19 testing
- Funding to help schools reopen safely
- Funding to help people afford health insurance if they lost their job or employer health coverage
- Funding to support state and local governments in dealing with the pandemic
- Emergency paid leave for parents
- Continuing unemployment insurance through Sept. for people who lost jobs because of pandemic, incl. self-employed & gig workers
- Expansion of the child tax credit for low- and middle-income families
- Increased food and nutrition assistance for low-income individuals, including infants and children
- Additional assistance for small businesses
- An increase in the minimum wage to \$15 per hour
- Emergency funding for local transit systems

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Even after pressure-testing against a hard-hitting criticism, two-thirds of voters continue to support the Biden COVID rescue package.

it does what is most needed to (a) slow and stop the spread of the coronavirus, (b) provide help to Americans who have been the hardest hit by the coronavirus, and (c) speed our economic recovery and prevent deep and permanent damage to the economy. Supporters say that, at a time when the number of new COVID-19 cases and deaths are at record highs, strong action is essential now to get the pandemic under control and get the country back on the road to recovery.

Opponents of President Biden's proposal say that the country already has spent \$4 trillion to address the coronavirus and we cannot afford another \$1.9 trillion that will put the country even deeper into debt. Opponents say Biden's plan isn't about combating COVID-19. It is a liberal wish list of items that should not be in a COVID-19 relief package.



HEALTHCARE AGENDA



After COVID is addressed, the dominant item on voters' agenda (by far) is lowering the cost of healthcare.

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There is urgency behind the issue, with three-quarters saying it is essential or very important that the President and Congress take action to lower healthcare costs this year.

How important is it for the president and Congress to pass legislation this year to lower the cost of healthcare and drugs and expand access to affordable health insurance?

Four in five perceive healthcare costs to be a major problem in the country, and three in five say that healthcare costs are at least somewhat of a problem for them personally.

In a similar vein, voters overwhelmingly think that a lack of access to affordable healthcare is a big problem.

On healthcare in general AND on specific aspects of healthcare, Biden and Democrats are more trusted than Republicans.



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There is broad support for several of the Democrats' healthcare policies, especially controlling drug prices.



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These provisions garner large majority support across party lines, with Republicans overwhelmingly supportive of taking action to lower Rx costs.

There is a downside for Republicans in obstructing the Democrats' healthcare agenda (and a warning sign for Democrats if they fail to deliver on healthcare this year).

Suppose most Republicans in Congress voted against the healthcare policies you have been looking at. How would it make you feel about Republicans in Congress?

55% would be less favorable to Democrats if they fail to pass any significant healthcare legislation this year (13% more favorable, 32% no difference) – including 57% of swing voters







Two-thirds of voters – including almost half of Republicans – want Democrats to do the most possible to lower healthcare costs, even if they have few or no Republicans on board.

Voters largely see the amount drug companies charge as unreasonable, and a fight over Medicare price negotiations carries significant upside for Democratic candidates.

Suppose in the next election for Congress the Democrat favors giving Medicare power to negotiate for lower drug prices and the Republican opposes this: how would this affect your vote?



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The argument for making drug companies negotiate with Medicare far outweighs the argument against it.

On the issue of drug prices, which do you agree with more?

Americans depend on the pharmaceutical industry to develop new cures and treatments to save lives, just as it did in developing safe and effective coronavirus vaccines. Putting government price controls on medicines will reduce the ability of the drug companies to discover new lifesaving cures and treatments for diseases such as Alzheimer's.



Drug companies are making record profits by charging outrageous amounts for medicines and constantly raising prices for drugs that people depend on. Far too many Americans cannot afford their prescriptions or go into debt to pay for them. Instead of letting drug companies charge whatever they want, we should make them negotiate with Medicare for fair prices.

The large majority of voters oppose the GOP lawsuit to overturn the ACA and want the law upheld.

With the support of President Trump and Republicans in Congress, several Republican state attorneys general have filed a lawsuit to completely repeal the Affordable Care Act. which if successful would end protections for people with preexisting conditions and cause more than 20 million Americans to lose their health insurance. This case is now pending before the U.S. Supreme Court. What would you prefer for the ACA?





More than a quarter (27%) of all voters who did NOT vote for the Democrat for Congress in November are "gettable" on the basis of these two healthcare issues (*Rx costs and/or ACA expansion*).

*Profile of voters who voted Republican or did not vote in the election for U.S. Congress, but say they would be more likely to vote for a Democratic candidate based on their stance on Medicare drug price negotiations and/or ACA expansion**

- Half (49%) are soft Republicans, while 22% are strong Republicans and 29% identify as Independents/Democrats.
 - 72% voted for Trump, but 20% voted for Biden (compared to only 8% of all non-Democrat voters). Half (52%) who voted for Trump did so with mixed feelings.
- They are evenly split on gender (49% male, 51% female) and 63% do not have college degrees. Half (49%) are in the suburbs, while 22% are in cities and 29% are in rural areas. Their age distribution looks like the electorate as a whole.
 - 79% identify as white (compared to 87% of all non-Democrat voters)
- 41% have a household income under \$50K (compared to 36% of all non-Democrat voters) and more importantly –
 44% say healthcare costs are a big problem for them personally (compared to 33% of all non-Democrat voters)
- 53% do not watch cable news. Of those that do, 24% watch Fox News, 19% watch CNN/MSNBC, and only 4% watch Newsmax/OANN.
