

Lower Costs, Better Care for Delawareans

There is an urgent need to lower health costs, expand coverage, and reduce racial health disparities across Delaware. That is why it is essential to ensure critical health care measures supported by President Biden remain in upcoming budget reconciliation legislation, specifically empowering Medicare to negotiate for lower drug prices for all Americans, creating a federal solution to close the Medicaid coverage gap, expanding Medicare benefits to include dental, vision, and hearing, and making the premium reductions included in the American Rescue Plan permanent, so Delawareans can continue to access low-cost coverage.

Americans support bold action to lower health costs and curb soaring drug prices, with [88 percent](#) in favor of allowing Medicare to negotiate with pharmaceutical corporations to lower prices. President Biden is committed to tackling these issues head on, demonstrated by his commitment to expanding health coverage through [enhanced subsidies](#), closing the [Medicaid coverage gap](#), and [support](#) for Medicare drug price negotiation.

Delawareans depend on affordable health care, expanded access to coverage, and drug pricing reform to live healthy lives. Empowering the federal government to negotiate prescription drug prices would save Americans more than [\\$150 billion](#) at the pharmacy counter and create an additional [\\$500 billion](#) in savings for the federal government that could be reinvested to [reduce premiums](#), [expand Medicare benefits](#) to include dental, vision, and hearing, and close the Medicaid coverage gap in the 12 states that have [refused to accept expansion](#). We must act now.

The American Rescue Plan Has Helped 25,320 Delawareans Access Affordable Care

- **Strong Marketplace Enrollment.** More than [25,000](#) Delaware residents have signed up for coverage through the Marketplace in 2021.
- **Increasing Health Coverage Access For Thousands of Delawareans.** The American Rescue Plan has [reduced or eliminated](#) Marketplace premiums for thousands in Delaware. Under the plan, [8,900](#) uninsured Delawareans are newly eligible for health coverage tax credits and 1,700 individuals have access to coverage with zero dollar premiums.
- **Meaningful Savings On Premiums.** Premium savings under the American Rescue Plan benefit all Americans. For example, a 60-year-old couple with an annual income of \$75,000 will see their monthly premiums drop from \$2,294, to just \$531, saving more than [\\$1,763](#) each month.
- **Improving Maternal Health Access.** For new mothers, the American Rescue Plan has created a pathway to coverage, providing states the opportunity to extend [postpartum coverage](#) under Medicaid from 60 days to 12 months following birth.

Lowering Prescription Drug Costs

- **Drug Price Hikes Are Outpacing Inflation.** In 2019, American prescription drug spending soared to [\\$369.7 billion](#), an increase of 5.7 percent, more than [three times](#) the inflation rate for the same period.
- **One Quarter Of Americans Struggle To Access Essential Medications.** [Nearly one in four](#) Americans taking prescription drugs struggles to afford needed medications, with 29 percent reporting not taking medications as instructed within the past year due to cost.
- **Drug Price Negotiation Would Save Billions.** The single most effective measure to bring down drug costs is to empower Medicare to negotiate prescription drug prices. Negotiation would save patients more than [\\$150 billion](#) and create [\\$500 billion](#) in savings for the federal government.
- **Reinvestment Of Savings.** When the federal government saves on drug costs, those funds become available to [reduce premiums](#), [expand Medicare benefits](#) to include dental, vision, and hearing, and close the [Medicaid coverage gap](#) in the 12 states that have [refused to accept expansion](#).

- **Medicare Drug Price Negotiation Is Overwhelming Popular.** [Nearly nine in ten](#) Americans support empowering Medicare to negotiate prescription drug prices.

Drug Prices In Delaware

- In 2019, Delawareans spent [nearly \\$19 million](#) in cash on prescription drugs.
- In 2017, [31 percent](#) of Delaware residents reported that they stopped taking a medication as prescribed due to cost. Nearly [80 percent](#) of Delawareans reported addressing drug prices as their top or major priority in 2021.
- According to research from [West Health](#), 26 percent of Delawareans reported they or someone in their household couldn't pay for a medication that their doctor prescribed, with one in ten reporting they knew someone who had died because they could not afford their medication in the past five years.
- [More than 260,000](#) Delawareans have chronic conditions like cancer, diabetes, and asthma that require prescription drugs for treatment and management.
- Delawareans overwhelmingly support allowing Medicare to negotiate better drug prices. A 2021 West Health survey found that [88 percent](#) of Delawareans support empowering Medicare to negotiate lower on behalf of patients.

Expanding Coverage

- **Millions Nationwide Would Gain Stable Coverage.** [4.2 million](#) uninsured people would gain coverage if the American Rescue Plan's subsidies are made permanent, and millions more would continue to save on health care costs.
- **Permanent Health Coverage Subsidies Would Benefit Older Delawareans.** More than 25,000 Delawareans selected a plan on the Marketplace in 2021, with older adults between [55 and 64](#) making up nearly a third of enrollees. The American Rescue Plan offers [significant relief](#) for older individuals, including those at 400 percent of the federal poverty level.

Expanding Medicare Benefits

- **Nearly 175,000 Delawareans Would Benefit From Expanded Coverage.** Nearly [38 million](#) traditional Medicare enrollees would gain dental, vision, and hearing coverage if Medicare benefits were expanded. Due to lack of coverage, [nearly half](#) of Medicare beneficiaries did not seek dental care in the past year.
- **Medicare Beneficiaries Are 21 Percent Of Delaware's Residents.** In 2018, more than [one in five](#) Delawareans were Medicare beneficiaries. Recent reports have found between [47](#) and [64](#) percent of Medicare beneficiaries do not have dental coverage, [74 percent](#) lack vision coverage, and [76 percent](#) go without hearing coverage.
- **Income And Racial Inequity Increase Health Disparities.** Half of all Medicare beneficiaries live on annual incomes below [\\$29,650](#), pushing dental, vision, and hearing coverage out of reach. For [beneficiaries of color](#) or those living in [rural](#) areas, accessing these essential benefits has become increasingly challenging.

Senator Chris Coons Is Standing Up For Delawareans' Care

Senator Coons Was An Enthusiastic Supporter Of The American Rescue Plan, Providing Relief For Thousands Of Delaware Families. Coons [voted for](#) the American Rescue Plan, historic legislation that includes measures to expand coverage and to dramatically lower health care costs for thousands of Delaware families. In addition to providing critical pandemic relief, the ARP lowers premiums for people purchasing coverage through the marketplaces and expands access to financial assistance for more middle-class families. Coons [praised the law](#), saying "The American Rescue Plan is what Delaware and our country need at this moment...The American Rescue Plan puts the full force of the federal government behind ending this pandemic and helping Delawareans recover."

Senator Coons Supports Efforts To Allow Medicare To Negotiate Drug Prices. Sen. Coons is a [cosponsor](#) of the Empowering Medicare Seniors to Negotiate Drug Prices Act, legislation which would allow for Medicare to negotiate the best possible price of prescription drugs to cut costs.

Representative Blunt Rochester Supported Providing Relief For Delaware Families With The American Rescue Plan. Blunt Rochester [voted for](#) the American Rescue Plan, historic legislation that includes measures to expand coverage and to dramatically lower health care costs for thousands of Delaware families. In addition to providing critical pandemic relief, the ARP lowers premiums for people purchasing coverage through the marketplaces and expands access to financial assistance for more middle-class families. Blunt Rochester [praised the law](#), saying "The American Rescue Plan is truly groundbreaking legislation that will allow our country to move from recovery to rebuilding."

Representative Blunt Rochester Voted For Historic Legislation To Lower Prescription Drug Prices. Representative Blunt Rochester voted for the 2019 Elijah E. Cummings Lower Drug Costs Now Act ([H.R. 3](#)), historic legislation to drastically reduce Americans' prescription drug prices by up to 55% and save taxpayers nearly \$500 billion over the next 10 years. H.R. 3 included the most comprehensive drug pricing reform in American history and the largest expansion to Medicare's benefits in decades.
