Subject: Strong Majority of Arizona Voters Support Swift Action on Build Back Better Economic Plans to Lower Healthcare and Prescription Costs

Date: January 27, 2022

A new Public Policy Polling survey finds strong support for plans to lower health care and drug prices among Arizona voters, the cornerstone of the Build Back Better economic plan. With so many worried about rising costs and inflation, 73% of Arizonans agree that bringing down prescription drug prices and lowering the cost of health insurance premiums would help families like theirs. Just 12% disagree.

Notably, voters want Congress to pass these plans now, not later. A strong majority (74%) of Arizonans say it is important that Congress work to lower prescription drug prices, give Medicare the power to negotiate drug prices, and lower insurance premiums this year.

Arizona voters have a low opinion of pharmaceutical companies—75% hold an unfavorable opinion, while just 8% view them favorably—and 86% think prescription drug prices are too high. An overwhelming majority of 74% support giving Medicare the power to lower prescription drug prices and there is notable bipartisan support which includes 85% of Democrats, 79% of independents, and 60% of Republicans. This also includes voters across all age groups, with support highest among seniors over the age of 65 (81%), followed by near equal support among voters between the ages of 46 and 65 (72%) and voters between the ages of 18 and 45 (71%). Meanwhile, voters reject the argument from the drug companies that letting Medicare negotiate prescription drug prices will undercut drug companies' ability to innovate and develop new drugs (74%-10%).

In addition, a strong majority of voters also support key plans to improve Medicare and expand Medicaid coverage to lower healthcare costs for Americans:

- 77% support using savings from lower drug prices to provide hearing benefits like hearing aids for seniors on Medicare, including 75% of independents and 69% of Republicans.
- 76% support closing the Medicaid coverage gap by Medicaid giving low- and moderate-income Americans, including seniors, children, and people who do not get insurance at work the opportunity to get health insurance and little or no cost if their state does not offer coverage under Medicaid. This support includes 74% of independents and 59% of Republicans.
- 76% support lowering the health insurance costs for people who buy insurance on their own by expanding tax credits and subsidies, including 72% of independents and 70% of Republicans.

Public Policy Polling surveyed 708 Arizona voters from January 24-25, 2022 on behalf of Protect Our Care. The margin of error is +/- 3.7%. 68% of interviews for the survey were conducted by text message and 32% by telephone.
